

Principal's Message



It is the Entrepreneur to think through what needs to be done to provide goods and services demanded by people. It is









The centre believes that individuals have unique ideas and need support to turn them into businesses. individuals These are guided through training, participate in enterprise challenges and then assigned mentors and coaches the develop business ideas.

The Centre has partnered with numerous organizations and one of them is Stanbic Bank under the Stanbic Bank Business

Incubator to provide training to different entrepreneurs. Other organizations that the Centre has partnered with include; NSSF, DFCU Bank, Orient Bank, Private Sector Foundation, MasterCard Foundation, Innovation Hub among others. The Centre has also birthed innovations Like; Teheca, Sumic Online, Naya Stores among others.

Aside that, research studies are conducted to generate important information for the programs that are running at the Centre. In line with this, the MUBS EIIC is the home of the Global Entrepreneurship Monitor (GEM). Recently the Centre conducted a study on the resilience of Ugandan entrepreneurs in the face of Covid-19 and entrepreneurs shared interesting stories and experiences on how they managed the situation.

The Centre also offers skills and knowledge in Entrepreneurship to help improve productivity and competitiveness of businesses in Uganda.

The MUBS Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Incubation Centre was established in 1998 as an outreach unit to link the school with the private, public and NGO sectors using different approaches.

At the establishment, it was known as the Small Business Development Centre that supported businesses through training and business clinics. It grew over time and in 2005 it became the Entrepreneurship Centre supporting not just small business development but the growth entrepreneurship. About four years ago, the African Development Bank supported the establishment of incubation centres at public universities in Uganda and MUBS Entrepreneurship Centre was transformed into the Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Incubation Center. Its five focus areas business incubation, include trainina, provision and dissemination of information, research and consultancy.

MUBS EIIC Business Development Services

Makerere University Business School-Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Incubation Centre has and continues to partner with various organizations both local and international to provide business development services (BDS) in the country. Our BDS services include training, coaching and business clinics. These services focus on Small and Medium Enterprises, Women, and the youth. The following BDS services were provided in the year 2022:

Training and Coaching Youth Champions

Makerere University Business School (MUBS) -Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Incubation Centre partnered with the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations under its AgrInvest Initiative with the Uganda Development Bank (UDB), to support young agripreneurs to access affordable credit. total of 135 Youth champions participated in the training and coaching programme. The BDS provided under the initiative involved conducting due diligence, developing modules and content, training, mentoring, and coaching, and follow up. A blended approach was adopted where both virtual and face to face sessions were carried out as part of the BDS programme. The training aimed at the equipping the selected youth champions with entrepreneurship and business management skills. The BDS programme was preceded by a 5-day in-person training that took place from 6th to 10th December 2021. Online coaching sessions were conducted from 10th to 31st January 2022. The BDS provided aimed at preparing the Youth Champions to access finance from formal financial institutions.



Coaching and Guiding Young Agripreneurs

Makerere University Business School Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Incubation Centre partnered with The Agriculture Organization Food and (FAO) of the United Nations, under Promoting Employment Opportunities and Agripreneurship among Youth and Women in Eastern Africa, to conduct a study and to provide Entrepreneurial coaching of young champion agripreneurs to formalize their business, scale up their businesses, access markets and finance. Through this initiative, BDS were provided to a total of 138 Youth Champions (YCs) between October 2021 and February 2022.

Training and Business Development Services for SMEs and SFI

University Makerere **Business** School-Innovation Entrepreneurship, and Incubation Centre (MUBS-EIIC) partnered with The Uganda Bankers' Association (UBA) to provide training services in the four (4) districts in Northern and Eastern Uganda including Gulu, Arua, Lira, and Soroti under the UBA- GIZ project entitled Promotion of Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency Programme (PREEEP). The aim of the project was to strengthen the capacity of SMEs and Supervised Financial Institutions (SFIs) in the renewable energy and energy efficiency sector in the four districts. MUBS



provided business training and development support to 179 SMEs and SFI between June and December 2022.

Nsindika Njake Ne MTN

MUBS Entrepreneurship, Innovation. and Incubation MTN partnered with Centre Uganda on Nsindika Njake, a reality TV show that aims at helping youths unlock their potential to successfully manage and grow their micro businesses. The radio and TV production was done by Kunta Productions. The overall objective of the intervention is to impart entrepreneurial and business skills among young people working in the informal sector in the country.

Through radio station partners, a total of 28 youth out of 5000+ applicants were selected to participate in the programme. Participants were equipped with various aspects of business management between March and June 2022. At every stage, participants were engaged in field-based activities and were required to pitch different aspects of business management before a panel of judges who selected the best teams to proceed to the next phase. MTN awarded the winner with



a grand cash prize of 60 million while the 1st runner-up received 20 million. The 2nd and the 3rd runners-up received 10 million each. The Radio stations that partnered in the initiative include Buddu, Simba, Galaxy and Dembe FM. MUBS also provided business mentorship and coaching, as well as resource persons including judges and coaches who supported the youths. Overall, the MUBS-EIIC provided project coordination in collaboration with MTN Uganda. Who engages them to implement their growth plans.

PSFU Soft Skills training for Work Readiness Programme



by MUBS- EIIC as a curriculum and training partner. The overall aim of the project is to address gaps in the employability and productivity among youna araduates Ugandafrom universities based institutions and/or of higher learning. MUBS commenced training of the 2

University School Makerere Business Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Incubation Centre (MUBS-EIIC) partnered with the Private Sector Foundation Uganda (PSFU) to provide work readiness soft skills training to recent graduates and make them ready for the workplace. Under the Work Readiness Program (WRP) skills, attitude, governance, and anti-corruption (SG+) project, PSFU is identifies private sector companies that are willing to take up selected graduates for internship for a period of six (6) months.

This training project is sponsored by Enabel, Cohorts in October 2022. A total of 1,000 in partnership with PSFU and implemented youths will be trained under this project.

Graduates into Employment Programme

The MUBS -EIIC has run the Graduates into Employment Programme (GIEP) for the past 23 years. GIEP provides practical training and experience to fresh graduates who are caught in the "catch 22" trap of "No job experience, no experience no job." The Centre trained 2 cohorts of graduates between April 19 and June 28, 2022. A total of 40 University finalists were equipped with employable and life skills.



WHAT IS EBOLA AND HOW DOES IT SPREAD?

- No vaccine and no cure available but EARLY treatment increases the chance of recovery

- Highly contagious; many people can quickly become infected

 - Family members

- · Contact with dead bodies can cause infection. BE CAREFUL (Bury carefully, Keep away)
- DO NOT wash, touch or kiss dead bodies
- DO NOT wash hands in the same bucket as others who have touched the body

Symptoms can start within 2 days of contact with an infected person or body

Nausea

Headache Tiredness

Vomiting

Diarrhoea Coughing

Bleeding (Including from no mouth, akin)

PREVENTION OF EBOLA AND WHAT TO DO IF YOU GET SICK



- You can catch EBOLA from someone who is sick or dead
- Wash your hands regularly use soap!
- DO NOT touch an infected person or their body fluids, including blood, vomit, faeces, urine

EBOLA is in animals and bats too.

- Only eat well cooked meat
- Avoid forest animals that are sick or found dead
- Avoid bats and bat meat

- Call your medical centre and tell them about your illness
 - Listen to the advice. You may be sent to a special hospital
 - Keep away from others so they don't get sick
- Be especially careful of your vomit and diarrhoea

MTN Uganda and MUBS EIIC Unveiled Entrepreneurship Show Dubbed "Nsindika Njake"

On April 4, 2022, MTN Uganda, in partnership with MUBS unveiled a youth-centered entrepreneurship TV show dubbed "Nsindika Njake." The show aimed at supporting the youth with business-related-skills to efficiently operate businesses sphere.

The show was to inspire and stimulate entrepreneurship penetration among the youth to help curb the high youth unemployment rates in the country.

"Given the high rate of youth unemployment, many youths have taken the right path of starting small businesses but sadly, majority of them have not had the opportunity to get the skills required to effectively operate a business."

"Nsindika Njake" is a TV show featuring budding entrepreneurs running small enterprises commonly referred to as 'hustles'. The show targets both the educated or skilled and the unskilled, with the goal of equipping them with the requisite business skills to successfully run their hustles.

The 12 participants were mentored and trained by the MUBS Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Incubation Center and this took a period of 12 weeks to the awarding ceremony.

Dr. Diana Ntamu, the Director MUBS Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Incubation Centre said the "Nsindika Njake" program is a very unique initiative focusing on both classroom and experiential learning aimed at harnessing the youths' entrepreneurial potential.

"92% of the young people that join the workforce in Uganda go to the informal sector and a lot of them are running SMEs yet they have no experience. As MUBS, we pride in supporting those young people through capacity building and mentorship so I must say that I am very excited to have worked with MTN. While MUBS fosters entrepreneurship, MTN Uganda wants to support young people," she noted. Dr. Ntamu further lauded MTN Uganda for this effort noting that tackling youth unemployment is a collaborative effort.

Jovan Kagezi won 60million, followed by David Kasaali, the first runners up who won Shs 20million, Shakirah Nassejje emerged as the second runners-up bagging 10million and Joseph Kwesiga, who also doubled as the people's choice award winner walked away with a total of Shs 10million: Shs 5million being the "Nsindika Njake" cash prize and Shs 5million for being the participant of choice for the public.

During his opening remarks, the Principal of MUBS Prof Waswa Balunywa said that covid19 has disrupted entrepreneurship in supply chain not only in Uganda but globally. He said that due to this, it is feared that inflation is going to hit 10% in Uganda which is very rare. Prof Balunywa added that globally, economies have been shrinking thus to be able to emerge from this effect, countries and their citizens must relay on entrepreneurship to be able to restore themselves from the level they were on before the pandemic.

"Entrepreneurship is becoming a global subject because governments, international organizations, NGOs and everyone are saying that the only way to get out of poverty is through entrepreneurship. Even in developed countries where poverty is not so much, they have started to look at entrepreneurship as a key. Entrepreneurship gives people the opportunity to create value for the economy they want to satisfy. If you want to see change in any society, you have to see entrepreneurship come up,"Prof. Balunywa elaborated.


Innovation Bootcamp

First established as a Faculty of Commerce in Makerere University, Makerere University Business School (MUBS) has grown over the past 25 years to become the leading provider of business and management education institution in the region.

The Faculty of Commerce became a fully fledged faculty in 1987. Before, it was a department in the Faculty of Social Sciences. The Faculty of Commerce is highly respected for pioneering private sponsorship programmes in Makerere in 1991 starting with a Bachelor and a Masters degrees.

25 years down the road, MUBS has grown from a small institution with 100 students into a leading business school that seeks to be the benchmark for Business and Management Education, Research and Training in the region which greatly

increased enrollment in Makerere.

In 1997, MUBS was created out of the merger between the Faculty of Commerce, Makerere and the National College of Business Studies, Nakawa. The School was therefore established as a constituent college of Makerere University (under the college order of 1997).

MUBS has transformed from a one degree programme institution to one with 19 bachelors degrees programmes, 13 masters degree programmes and 3 doctoral programmes. This has led to the raise in students numbers from 100 to 17,000 students currently.

Delft University of Technology also known as TU Delft, is the oldest and largest Dutch public technical university, located in Delft, Netherlands. As of 2022 it is ranked by QS World University Rankings among the top 10 engineering and technology universities in the world in the following subjects; Architecture, Civil & Structural Mechanical, Engineering, Aeronautical & Manufacturing Engineering, Water Transportational Resources, Sciences, Computer science, technology Management, Marine/Ocean Engineering and Chemical Engineering.

The Delft Centre for Entrepreneurship (DCE), partofthe Delft University of Technology, Faculty of Technology, Policy and Management, is responsible for the provision of educational programs and conducts research programs related to Technology Entrepreneurship.

The programs are available at bachelor, master and PhD level as well as several online programs and executive courses. Students across all the faculties of TU Delft are trained and motivated in their entrepreneurial activity with a goal to start a new technology-based venture or venture projects within established organizations.

The partnership between MUBS-EIIC and Delft Centre for Entrepreneurship began in 2017-218 through a collaborative training program on how to build a sustainable business model in supporting Entrepreneurship which I and focal persons for regional campuses attended where we met Ellen van Andel representative from Delft Centre for Entrepreneurship. We established a relationship and entered a

partnership to support the international internship program and TUDelft sent us three students in 2019 to come and support students' projects in the faculty of computing and Informatics and businesses in the MUBS-EIIC accelerator program.

These students come to the Centre and we assign them the role of startup Associates and we engage them in peer-to-peer learning to gain practical entrepreneurial skills and experience while in Uganda. We conduct trainings, Mentorship sessions and also attach them to the different student projects especially Faculty of Computing and Informatics and ICT Centre, we also attach them to some of our startups in the accelerator program (Startup garage) for them to learn and also gain hands on experience and allow them to bring their technological expertise into the businesses and projects. We receive interns every year from November - January. We are privileged to have a supporting Principal who is also our board chair Prof Waswa Balunywa who

hosts the students in his Iganga home for the last two weeks of their internship in January and while over there, they are able to work with different youths and women to remodel their businesses or ideas with our support at the Centre. They help us in conducting needs assessment, due diligence, and then give us reports which inform our decisions.

In 2019 we received three interns, Noor, Dagn and Thomas.

In 2020, It was unfortunate that we had lockdown however we pivoted and also our partners are Tech oriented. We quickly grasped the usage of virtual and collaborative tools to conduct online sessions and we had the Interns. We linked the interns to Startup Associates, Viola Awor, student from Faculty of Computing and Deborah Agaba from the Faculty of Entrepreneurship to guide, coordinate and conduct the virtual internship to be able to accelerate with different groups as planned to be attached to and we had three student interns Maxime Staleman, Maarten Hartman, and Aster Tournoy.

In 2021 we received three Interns Tom Dutilh, Joost van Maanen, and Maxime van Berkum. But also, to further strengthen our relationship Delft Global an Initiative to use technology expertise to find concrete solutions for worldwide problems, in close cooperation with local partners, funded I and focal Person Jinja Mr. Daniel Walubingo to visit TUDeflt, discover and gain experience on where the students come from, how they are introduced to entrepreneurship and how to further support them to get the entrepreneurial skills as they further



their education. We had a two-week disruptive tour where we pitched to the students the project for their internship and we have received two students, Job and Annika. These students don't come to Uganda automatically, as a Center we have to coin up a road map and a project that we are going to attach these students to and pitch to them and they pick interest.





What Has Been The Role Of Entrepreneurship In Uganda Since 1962?



The MUBS Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Incubation Centre (MUBS EIIC) celebrated the Global Entrepreneurship Week from November 14-20, 2022. The week that saw a series of events in line with entrepreneurship, hosted a dialogue on November 18, 2022. The dialogue that was held under the theme; "60 years of Entrepreneurship in Uganda: Challenges and Prospects" was facilitated by Prof. Waswa Balunywa.

In his facilitation, Prof. Balunywa said that entrepreneurship is extremely important in the growth of every economy. "Institutions like the World Bank are trying to see; how they can increase the uptake of entrepreneurship in countries, how they can on-board those that are not in entrepreneurship, how they can make people more entrepreneurial. These are some of the issues being looked into because there is a feeling that the challenges the world is facing; primarily poverty can be addressed with entrepreneurship."

Prof. Balunywa also posed a challenging question when he said that as Uganda is celebrating 60 years of independence, what has been the role of entrepreneurship since 1962? He highlighted the evolution of entrepreneurship saying that people have been producing goods for self consumption until the time of the industrial revolution in the 1960s-1980s.

"Some scientists discovered the steam engine, electricity, computerization and today we are looking at digitalization. All this means that the factories brought an end to the production for self consumption in Europe, North America, parts of Asia and that every body had to produce something and go exchange it for another. The laws of Adam and Smith that was advocating for the specialization and division of labour contributed to the growth of the capitalists system and the growth of the entrepreneur."

The ultimate contribution is how academia shapes business practice and subsequent contribution economic development.

Since 2017, MUBS started participating in a number of agri-related events with different industry stakeholders, with a view of bridging the existing gap between entrepreneurship and the agricultural sector. This was largely based on individual efforts, but well aware of the support and interest of top management in this thematic area, in addition to its acknowledged priority posture in the country's development agenda. Some of the notable projects include the AGRIQUEST research project headed by Prof. David Katamba, the Doctoral Study on Smallholder Commercialisation by Dr. Catherine Tindiwensi and the various agri projects at the MUBS Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Incubation Centre. It was from this personal initiative perspective that a partnership was fostered between MUBS and the Agripreneurship Alliance, a Swiss based non-profit organization.

The flagship activity has been "Entrepreneurship **Agribusiness** Training". This groundis breaking program that enables African young entrepreneurs within the agri-food sector to develop or enhance their business ideas and

create a high-quality business plan to support the launch or growth of their agri-business. The 'Entrepreneurship in Agribusiness' course adopts a 'blended learning' approach enabling an in-house taught course to be supported by an online platform managed by the African Management Institute. The teaching approach is experiential enabling the active learning of participants.

Over the last 3 years MUBS has trained over 100 students who have been equipped with skills from business ideation to market analysis and development of a business plan. The students who complete the rigorous 10 week course participate in the business plans and the best business plan wins a prize of \$1000 to support their agribusiness.

During the 2022 Calendar year, a total of 25 students participated in the training, of which six participated in the Business Plan Competition. The evaluation process is fully handled by the Agripreneurship Alliance-Switzerland, with support from voluntary International reviewers. Each contestant is given detailed feedback to help them improve their business. The Award Winner for 2022 (Cohort 4) emerged as Ms Sandra Ankunda whose business will be producing and selling instant matooke flour and raw matooke flour that can be used as baking flour to make bread, biscuits, cakes, pastry, porridge and other processed products including baby food. She intends to use the prize money to implement her brilliant idea just like her predecessors. She will also undergo business incubation under the MUBS Entrepreneurship Innovation and Incubation Centre. We also recognize the contestants who went through this rigorous training program and developed promising business plans.

We are proud that the prize winners are able to put the money to good use to run promising agribusinesses, that is, Ms. Memory Atuhaire (Prize Winner, 2020) of Alma's Sweet Honey and Ms. Charlotte Agiko (Prize Winner, 2021) of Charlotte's Tasty Rabbit Meat.

We are grateful to MUBS leadership and the Director of the MUBS Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Incubation Centre - Dr. Diana Ntamu, for the support to enable us "Enable the Future of Our Clients". 
